Proposed 2019-2020 Budget for ESU #13

A copy of the Budget Document has been uploaded to the website. The proposed budget reflects an increase of \$4,273,019 over last year's adopted budget. The increase is in part due to decreased state aid for core services. In addition, the budget includes expenses for the Sidney building project, phone upgrade, and new federal projects. The Finance Committee reviewed the budget on September 6, 2019. **Recommendation**: Move to approve the 2019-2020 proposed budget for the operation of ESU #13 in the amount of \$20,286,341.00.

Appendix A

Administrator Notes September 2019

Nebraska Association of School Boards (NASB)

I would like to personally thank our Board Members who were recognized at the NASB Area Membership meeting. Award of Achievements were presented to Steve Diemoz (Level 8), Bill Knapper (Level 7), Ray Richards and Mark Sinner (Level 5), Kim Marx and Patricia Jones (Level 4), Don Egging (Level 3), Diane Coon and Scott Marsh (Level 2) and Tim Horn (Level 1).

Finance Committee and the 2019-2020 Budget

The Finance Committee met to review the budget on September 6th. Members of the Committee were Bill, Ray and Mark. Tom was out of town. We will be lowering the cash reserve by \$3,500,000 if we spend everything that is budgeted leaving \$1,779,956. Tax valuation is down by 0.175%, and Core Service dollars are down \$73,172.40, therefore our levy increased to .014993 from .013981.

Job Descriptions

Our current job descriptions are outdated and lacking pertinent information, such as FLSA status. The Perry Law Firm has developed a "master" job description along with position specific job descriptions, which alleviates the need for a 10 page job description. The "master" document includes everything that legal counsel would want if there was a discrimination, worker's compensation, ADA issue, etc. The specific job description is (hopefully) easily readable and more to the point. The entire series of job descriptions cost to ESUs was \$400 and they are willing to add any job descriptions that we may need that are not currently included.

Human Resources and Communications Specialist Position

Jerry Becking was selected as the supervisor of the Ecological In-Home Family Treatment Program. As a result, we have a vacancy in our Human Resources Manager position. After reviewing the position and talking with the Leadership Team, we have begun advertising for a Human Resources and Communication Specialist.

Facilities Committee

In the near future, I would like to convene the Facilities Committee (Steve, Tom, Ray, Mark) to discuss long term planning regarding facility needs so we can then prioritize funding accordingly. There are a multitude of factors to be considered, which include, dollars associated with spaces being rented, current computer lab, future of the Van Newkirk building, Day Treatment/Day School, etc. Could we put a date on our calendars for a meeting?

Department Updates

Starting in October, each Director will provide a brief overview and update of their respective department.

Follow Up - NRCSA

- Jack Moles will be testifying on behalf of ESUs on October 4th (LR 63-ESU Interim Study).
- ESU 6 values having an Executive Director (NRCSA) who is mindful of the interests of rural schools and is on point with senators throughout the legislative session is a very prudent investment. Per Dr. Skretta, Jack is at the table and in conversations routinely with senators representing our collective interests in a manner that is simply unfeasible for a single ESU administrator or superintendent to accomplish.
- ESU 10 We are a member of NRCSA and have chosen to remain due to their support of our ESU's strong supporters our rural schools.
- ESU 11 Per Greg Barnes, I think they are very good about supporting ESUs. I know last year when there were hearings about property taxes and such, I heard Jack Moles on more than one occasion state that they would support it as long as it doesn't hurt ESUs because the rural schools need strong ESUs. I have seen other communications with senators from NRCSA stating the same. They also have professional development opportunities, but in my opinion the main reason we are members at ESU 11 is to support the lobbying they provide for our rural schools and our ESUs.
- ESUCC Executive Director (former Administrator of ESU 9) I can tell you that Jack Moles has really gone to bat for ESUs. No question! The very first person to testify during the LB 289 Hearing was Jack. He made it clear that our schools and NRCSA rely on us. He is also at our legislative coalition meetings where he emphasizes support. I think, because of that alone, it's worth the membership fee.

LR 63 Update

LR 63 was introduced by Senator LouAnn Linehan and is intended to examine ESUs including structure, duties, current projects and financing. I will be attending the public hearing on October 4th at the State Capitol. Our Leadership Team is gathering letters from superintendents, principals and parents illustrating the benefits they receive from our ESU. We would welcome letters of support from ESU Board Members as well.

Changing Payroll Date

For the 2020/2021 school year, we will be changing the date of payroll to the 5th day of each month, effective September 5, 2020. This will ensure staff are paid on or before the 5th of each month.

Bids for Snow Blade

Over the course of the last three fiscal years, we have paid a total of \$8,520 for snow removal service. At the encouragement of Fermin, we will install a blade on our new Chevy pickup. Fermin is exploring a few different options, but we may need to solicit bids. If bids are sought, we would be looking at a bid opening in October.

Vehicle Update

We have made a change to how we fund Unit Transportation. Previously, we used a flat mileage rate (\$.23) and tax dollars to fund Unit Transportation. Departments were then required to pay their own gas receipts. For the 2019/2020 school year, Jodi and Kerri calculated all costs associated with Unit Transportation (gas, repairs, service, salaries, and vehicle replacement) and came up with a new mileage rate (\$.52) that will be used to fund Unit Transportation. As of September 13th, 11 of 41 vehicles have over 200,000 miles. The model year of these vehicles ranges from 1997-2009, and the vehicles are in our fleet, Meridian, and LifeLink programs. At the August Board Meeting we purchased two new Chevy Equinoxes, and we will be putting out a bid request for one or two four door sedans in the near future.

- 5. Based on proposed property tax request and changes in other revenue, the total operating budget of ESU 13 will exceed last year's by 27%.
