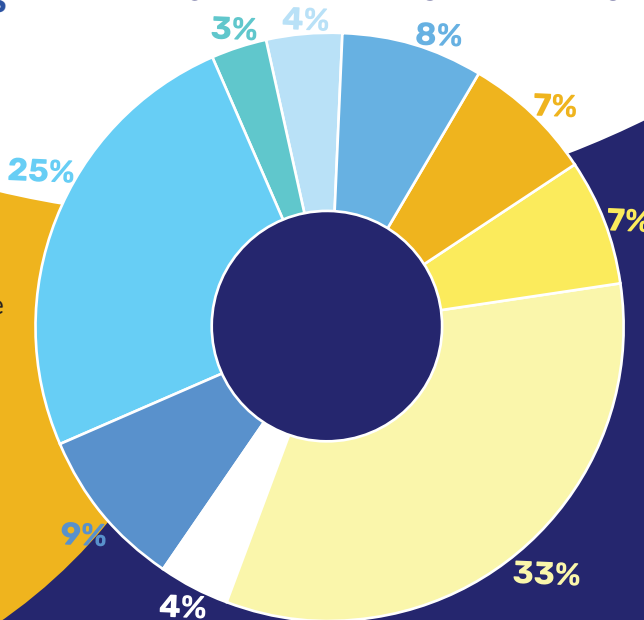

A special thank you to Dr. Laura Barrett for her visionary leadership, which has guided the organization toward continued growth and success.

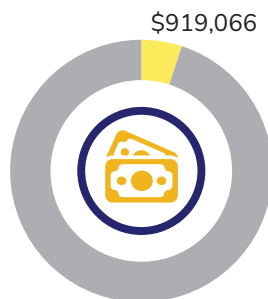
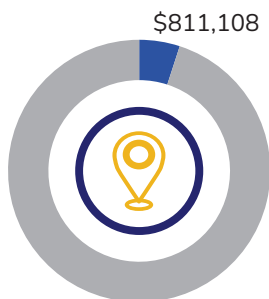
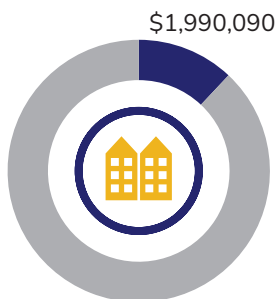
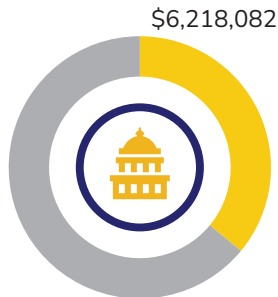
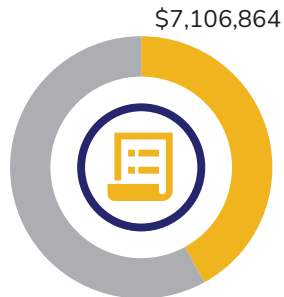

OUR SERVICES

NEARLY \$7M was accessed through local, state and federal grants for supplemental services, at no cost, to students, families, school staff and childcare providers.

ADMINISTRATION

Our Administration Department provides administrative support and leadership to staff and member school districts by:

- Facilitating the Superintendents' Administrative Advisory Council
- Serving as a liaison to NDE and ESUCC
- Representing ESU 13 throughout the panhandle
- Securing and allocating revenue sources
- Grant management
- Providing a safe and clean environment at ESU 13 facilities

2023-2024 Highlights

- The total savings through cooperative purchasing amounted to \$482,415. This program was utilized by 27 entities, including local public and non-public schools, as well as area public agencies.
- For every dollar collected in property taxes, we leveraged an impressive \$11.97 of additional funding to provide necessary support to our schools. Even after accounting for the property taxes that fund schools, we still secured \$2.92 in external funding, ensuring high-quality services at minimal or no cost to our schools.
- We accessed nearly \$7M through local, state and federal grants for supplemental services, at no cost, to students, families, school staff and childcare providers.

ALTERNATIVE EDUCATION

Our Alternative Education Department provides alternative education opportunities to high school students in the panhandle through the following programs:

- Valley Alternative Learning Transitioning School (VALTS) - Scottsbluff and Sidney campuses
- Nebraska Education Virtual Academy (NEVA)

2023-2024 Highlights

- A total of 19 students graduated from VALTS including 10 from Gering, 4 from Bridgeport, and 1 graduate each from Mitchell, Morrill, Minatare, Banner County, and Bayard.
- To date, a total of 771 students have graduated from 11 area high schools.

EARLY CHILDHOOD

Our Early Childhood Department provides quality experiences for children birth to age eight through the following programs:

- Early Development Network (EDN)
- Panhandle Early Learning Connections (PELC)
- Rooted in Relationships
- Sixpence Sprouting Success
- Early Childhood Multi-Tiered System of Supports
- Early Learning Connections coach consulting

2023-2024 Highlights

- PELC offered 96 license required trainings and advanced learning opportunities to child care providers.
- Sixpence Child Care Partnerships and Rooted in Relationships provided 432 coaching sessions to partnering child care programs and providers.
- The EDN worked 183 referrals of children Birth to 3 for 12 school districts in Planning Region Team 13 and 14.

HEAD START

Krystie Hohnstein, Director

Head Start (HS) plays a vital role in serving young children and families in Scotts Bluff, Cheyenne, and Morrill Counties. Key aspects include:

- Serving children birth to five years old, with Early Head Start (EHS) - birth to age 3 and HS - ages 3 to 5.
- Holistic approach addressing health, education, special services, family services, and parent engagement.
- 80% of funding comes from U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and 20% from community volunteerism, partnerships, and donations.
- Guided by Performance Standards emphasizing parent education, health services, nutrition, and child individualization.
- Developed through research and collaboration, ensuring comprehensive support for children and families.

2023-2024 Highlights

- ESU 13 HS completed their first year of EHS services in Bridgeport, serving 8 infants and toddlers from the community.
- 28% of HS and 20% of EHS children received services for an Individualized Education Program or Individualized Family Service Plan.

PROFESSIONAL LEARNING

Professional Learning offers collaborative development and support for teachers, staff, and administrators, addressing district needs by:

- Assessment analysis and application of diagnostic, formative, interim, and summative data.
- Guidance in Continuous Improvement Processes through Multi-tiered System of Support (MTSS) practices.
- Instructional material selection and implementation assistance.
- Content-specific instructional guidance.
- Leadership opportunities for superintendents and principals.
- New Teacher Academy.
- Specialist networking for administrative assistants, high ability learner leaders, English learner instructors, and paraprofessionals.
- Student event coordination.

Professional Learning enhances student outcomes, supports school improvement, and helps schools meet state and national requirements.

2023-2024 Highlights

- 113 services were offered to Panhandle school districts.
- 1,652 service activity hours were logged.
- 2,436 students attended Professional Learning sponsored student events.
- 8,681 registrations from school staff members.
- 6,023 ESU 13 provider hours.

PSYCHOLOGICAL & BEHAVIORAL HEALTH

- Mobile Youth Intensive Outpatient program
- Doctoral psychology internship site

- Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) Title IV-A Consortium
- Ecological In-Home Family Treatment (EIHFT)
- Education and training for schools, youth, and families
- Panhandle Beginnings Day Treatment School (PBDTX)

- 150 youth and families received therapeutic treatment
- Nearly 500 students evaluated this year.

Our Title IC Migrant Education Department identifies eligible students and provides the following educational and support services:

- Academic instruction
- Bilingual and multicultural supports
- Post secondary and vocational guidance
- Leadership development
- Counseling services
- Health and wellness supports
- Preschool services
- Family advocacy

2023 -2024 Highlights

- 267 students enrolled in the region were served and offered support services.
- 99 students received supplemental instructional services.
- 57 students were identified as Priority for Service (PFS), and all received support.
- 99 students were identified as At Risk, with all receiving services.
- Of the 2,500+ documented services provided, 25% were instructional, and 75% were support services.

TECHNOLOGY

Our Technology Department provides a wide variety of technology services and support to ESU 13 staff and member school districts through:

- Network support
- Digital resources
- Distance learning
- Digital citizenship
- E-Rate guidance
- Technology training and support
- LAN manager and media specialist meetings

2023-2024 Highlights

- Assisted member school districts in applying for over \$700,000 in E-Rate eligible services and equipment this past year. Due to our high poverty rates in western Nebraska, over \$544,000 was discounted, resulting in more than a 75% savings. E-Rate is a program that helps schools afford telecommunications and internet services, funded by the Universal Service Fund and administered by the Universal Service Administrative Company.
- In the spring, our Tech team, alongside a professional grant writing team, submitted a \$1 million USDA Rural Utility Distance Learning grant. Grant awards are expected in fall 2024. This grant will greatly benefit staff and students in our ESU 13 districts, helping to bridge the gap between students and the wealth of educational opportunities beyond their immediate surroundings.
